- Toward Zero Baltimore, established in 2018
- High Crash Reduction Report, 2021
- Toward Zero Quickbuild Program, 2021 present
- Neighborhood Traffic Calming Program, 2022 present
- Strategic Highway Safety Plan, 2022
- HSIP funds awarded 2022, 2023, 2024
- Unofficial High Injury Network updated annually




TOWARD ZERO PROGRAM: PRESENT

 - Mount Clare



2021 - 2023 Serious Injury and Fatality Crash Heatmap and High Injury Road Segments





TOWARD ZERO PROGRAM: PRIORITIZED LOCATIONS - WEST



- •Pratt Street, from Frederick Avenue to Martin Luther King Jr Boulevard
- •Monroe Street, from Baltimore Street to Eagle Street
- Wilkens Avenue, Ramsay Street, and Mount Street intersection
- •Frederick Avenue and Pulaski Street intersection
- Baltimore Street and Calverton,
 Smallwood, Pulaski, and Payson
 Street intersections
- •Ramsay, Ashton, and Payson intersection



TOWARD ZERO PROGRAM: PRIORITIZED LOCATIONS - EAST



- •Fayette Street, from Luzerne Avenue to Kenwood Avenue
- •Jefferson Street, from Patterson Park Avenue to Highland Avenue
- Madison Street, from Washington
 Street to Milton Avenue
- Madison Street and Montford Avenue intersection
- •Fayette Street, Pulaski Highway, and Lakewood Avenue intersection


- Transportation Priorities survey




TOWARD ZERO VS VISION ZERO

- Vision Zero means committing to a date to end traffic deaths and serious injuries.
- More public accountability means more urgent interventions
- Establish a sanctioned, expedited project process for the most unsafe locations
- Establish a stable funding source
- Establish staffing
- Educate and spread awareness of the issue and the solutions

















VISION ZERO ACTION PLAN: DEVELOPING THE COMMUNICATIONS STRATEGY

- Goal: Improve public perception of feasibility for different travel modes
- Strategies:
 - Spread awareness of Complete Streets
 - Activate new allies in support of safe transportation systems
 - Increase walking, biking, and transit trips to promote respect between travel modes



VISION ZERO ACTION PLAN: DEVELOPING THE COMMUNICATIONS STRATEGY

- Researching best practices in Complete Streets community engagement
- Finding the population who is unfamiliar/undecided on Complete Streets
- Recruiting a paid "brain trust" to develop content, messaging
- Recruiting paid focus groups from the unfamiliar/undecided population
- Activations in the fall to test messaging and programs
- Develop overarching strategy for a public information campaign about Complete Streets





VISION ZERO ACTION PLAN: DEVELOPING POLICY RECOMMENDATIONS

- Documenting policies and programs from cities that are making progress on their Vision Zero goals
- Conducting interviews with City staff
- Advisory group that will meet throughout the summer and fall
- Recommending policies, processes, and programs to fit the Baltimore context
- This includes how to authorize Vision Zero as a Baltimore City policy and how it should be governed, measured, and held accountable



VISION ZERO ACTION PLAN: ACTIVATING THE PUBLIC

- Pop-up events this summer and early fall to vet the High Injury Network and receive input on prioritization
- Safety summits toward the end of the year to showcase the recommendations and receive input
- Gathering stories of people's experience with traffic violence

Website and Near-Miss survey are launched Spring 2025

Community popup events for more near-miss input. Brain trust recruitment begins Summer 2025

Brain trust meets, focus groups meet.

End of summer – draft HIN is ready for public review Fall 2025

Open house-style events and online public input on the HIN, recommended policies and programs, communications strategies

Winter 2026

Draft Vision Zero Action Plan is released Early Spring 2026

Vision Zero is adopted as an official City policy and Vision Zero Action Plan is approved by the Planning Commission
