Dear Secretary Porcari:

Congratulations once again on your recent appointment and thank you for the candid conversation we recently had in your offices about Howard County's priority transportation needs. I am looking forward to a collegial and mutually beneficial relationship with you and your staff.

I am writing to provide you with an updated Howard County Administration list of priority projects for proposed inclusion in the FY08 to FY13 Consolidated Transportation Program. I am cognizant that our priorities this year are tempered by the need to accommodate anticipated BRAC related impacts within the region and the State. I also recognize that the State is confronting serious budgetary issues; and I wish to express my support for your efforts to evaluate and move forward with appropriate revenue cahancement options.

I am pleased to note that ridership on Howard Transit continues to grow, and for fiscal year 2007 will approach 900,000 trips for our combined fixed route and paratransit services. The success of these services is attributed in large measure to the technical assistance provided by MTA this past year. I am also gratified by progress this year on several important highway planning and engineering studies including I-70, US1 and the US29/US40 intersection. Howard County will continue to support these and other projects of regional importance through the judicious use of our excise tax revenues.


As we discussed, my highest transit priority this year is for funding to replace as many buses in our aging fleet as possible, and to do so with environmentally responsible diesel electric hybrid vehicles. I am committed to supporting this effort as needed with additional County funds beyond the traditional formula matching requirements. It is also of vital importance for the State to continue to provide technical and financial support for our efforts to develop a Central Maryland Transit Operations Facility (CMTOF) at Fort Meade.

My top highway priority is for the State to begin a project planning study of grade separation options to relieve chronic traffic congestion at the USI/MD175 intersection and the widening of Route 175 between 1-95 and the Baltimore-Washington Parkway. Eliminating this bottleneck is essential in order to facilitate regional travel demand to and from Fort Meade and NSA. Furthermore, in order to accommodate regional travel between Fort Meade and 1-95, I request that SHA begin a project planning study to provide a minimum of four mainline lanes on MD175 from US1 to MD295.


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
